





Continued regional growth and industrial expansion




Chatham County's population is estimated to have grown by about 14% since 2010.

As of Q1 2023, the Savannah area has 104 million square feet of industrial space, with another 25 million under construction.






Continued regional growth and industrial expansion



- Advocate for strong tree ordinance adoption in all municipalities across Chatham County

Aging tree canopy




The majority of downtown's tree canopy was planted in the late 1890s and early 1900s. Most urban live oaks will live to be about 150 years old, aging out around 2040.

Many existing trees in underserved areas are dead or dying, creating safety hazards.





Aging tree canopy




- ► Encourage City of Savannah and Chatham County to develop urban forest management plan.
- Reclaim lost tree lawns to start planting tomorrow's canopy.
- Advocate for a tree removal and replanting assistance program.





► Increased occurrences of pests and disease



Increased globalization means that pests and disease travel quicker and further.


Savannah has already lost 1000+ sugarberry trees to an unknown disease

Asian Longhorned Beetle was recently found in SC





► Increased occurrences of pests and disease



- Educate community on what to look for when identifying potential pests and diseases
- ► Ensure we plant diverse tree species in our own plantings and encourage our municipal partners to do so as well
- Grow our own trees to control diversity and availability





► Impacts of changing climate



Area sea level is 11 inches higher than it was in 1950, leading to saltwater intrusion in our coastal forests

Savannah's dangerously hot days are expected to double between 2000 and 2030, with an estimated 81 days above 105°F each year by 2030





► Impacts of changing climate



- ► Plant trees to absorb stormwater, helping to mitigate flood impacts from increased sea levels.
- ► Plant trees to clean and cool the air, providing both short-term and long-term relief from effects of climate change.



New STF Programs

Trees for Private Property



- ► 85% of land in Chatham County is privately-owned
- Counteract tree removals on private property
- Promote diverse tree species
- ► 1,200 3-gallon trees given away last planting season
- Funding source: Corporate partners, grants

New STF Programs

Community Tree Nursery



- ► Opened April 2024
- Control the supply and quality of native trees for our programs
- Education and volunteer hub for STF
- Potential source of revenue
- Funding source: GoFundMe, Land and utility donation by Dulany Industries

New STF Programs

Chatham Canopy Corps



- Starts Summer 2024
- Green job training
- Year-long, full-time, paid program
- Target people not traditionally represented in the field
- Plant on private property where it's needed most
- Funding source: Inflation Reduction Act funds, passed through Georgia Forestry Commission
