


# A Developmental History of:

# 401-409 East Bay Street





## **Existing Conditions Summary**


401–409 East Bay Street currently consists of three buildings on two parcels. Over time, there have been multiple buildings and multiple parcels on this site, all with differing and changing addresses. Therefore, for the sake of clarity in this developmental history, the existing buildings on the site have been labeled Sites A, B, and C.

The first building, on Site A, at the intersection of East Bay and Habersham Streets, is a non-contributing building, constructed sometime between 1954 and 1973. It is in poor condition.


The second building, on Site B, is a contributing building to the District. It is a one-story brick building and was constructed between 1888 and 1898. It is in fair condition with the exception of the south wall (along Bay Lane) which has significant structural damage.


The third building, on Site C, is a non-contributing building constructed prior to 1937. It is a one-story brick building and is in good condition.













Between 1884 and 1898, Site A served multiple buildings, including a three-story wood and brick boarding house called the "Bay View House" and a two-story brick barber shop. A wrap-around awning connected the buildings. Along the lane, there was a two-story grocery building that was converted to a "Tin Shop" by 1898.




Between 1916 and 1937, the site remained largely unchanged with minor alterations occurring at the rear of the buildings. The Cadastral Survey from 1937 noted the property owner as Pearl H. Gnann, who also owned a number of the properties on this block.

Between 1937 and 1947, all the buildings on Site A were demolished and replaced with a new concrete block building occupying the entire site. The building was likely designed by Savannah architect John C. Lebey.


1973



By 1973, the concrete block building was removed and replaced with the current building. Originally it appears to have had a drivethru canopy which no longer exists. It remained as an operating dry cleaners until approximately 2018. It has been vacant since.








In 1884, wood and brick buildings occupied Site B, housing a machine shop and office storage. By 1888, the buildings were vacant. By 1898, the buildings had been demolished and replaced with the current building, a one-story brick structure which housed a wholesale grocery store.




By 1916, the building housed Best Laundry. The Cadastral Survey showed the building was owned by Pearl H. Gnann. According to the US Census of 1940, Ms. Gnann was born about 1881 and lived at 425 Bull Street, with her 4 sons, 3 daughters, 2 grandsons, and 2 granddaughters. She owned multiple buildings on this block.











The building remained largely unchanged after 1898.




The building appeared to be vacant and overgrown by the 1980s. It remains in fair condition, except the south wall along Bay Lane which is in poor condition.













From 1884 to 1888, Site C housed a two-story wooden building with a raised stoop and basement, which served as two dwellings, one along Bay Street and one along Bay Lane. By 1898, the building had become a boarding house.




By 1916, the rear of the building had brick added to the facade, and the Bay Street portion was serving as a flat, while the Bay Lane portion served as a dwelling. By 1937, the building had been demolished and replaced with the existing one-story brick building, extending all the way to Bay Lane. Pearl H. Gnann was noted as the owner of this building as well.











Sometime between 1954 and 1973, the rear portion of building was removed.
