Roll Call

I. Approval of Agenda

Mr. Bill Kelso, Goodwill Industries, motioned to approve the Agenda, seconded by Mr. Tony Abbott, Interested Citizen. The motion passed with none opposed.

II. Action Items

1. Election of Temporary Committee Officers

Ms. Asia Hernton, CORE MPO staff, said we will elect a temporary Chairperson and Vice Chairperson who will preside over meetings until the official election in December 2024. The election of officers will be decided by a simple majority vote of those in attendance.

Ms. Asia Hernton nominates Mr. Armand Turner for temporary Chairperson for the TEPIAC.

Mr. Armand Turner, Interested Citizen, stated thank you for the nomination. Will Mondays at 1pm be the typical meeting date and time?

Ms. Asia Hernton stated that has not been determined yet. That will be our second item, determining of 2024 and 2025 Meeting Schedule. This is just a date we picked according to the survey; it was when most people could attend. We still have not decided on a schedule.

Mr. Armand Turner stated that he is going back to school and unavailable in the evenings. Besides that, he will accept the nomination.

Ms. Asia Hernton asked if the 1pm time for works for Mr. Armand Turner?

Mr. Armand Turner stated yes.

Mr. Armand Turner was nominated for temporary Chairperson of the TEPIAC. The motion passed with none opposed.

Ms. Asia Hernton stated there was a nomination for Mr. Shannon Ginn. Are there any other nominations? Hearing none, Mr. Shannon Ginn, do you accept the nomination?

Mr. Shannon Ginn, LIFE, stated he is not sure, as he is concerned about his LIFE part-time schedule. He would like to talk more with Ms. Asia Hernton about it one on one.

Ms. Asia Hernton asked if Mr. Shannon Ginn thinks he could be a temporary Vice Chairperson until December? As Vice Chairperson, if Chairperson Armand Turner cannot run the meeting, it would be Mr. Shannon Ginn that runs the meeting.

Mr. Shannon Ginn stated yes, he will be Vice Chairperson. If Ms. Asia Hernton could please send him what he needs to do and he will go from there.

Mr. Shannon Ginn was nominated for temporary Vice Chairperson of the TEPIAC. The motion passed with none opposed.

2. Determination of 2024 and 2025 Meeting Schedule

Ms. Asia Hernton stated that we do not have a set schedule for the TEPIAC at the moment. In the Bylaws it states that TEPIAC has to meet at least quarterly, unless stated otherwise. We do not have a set schedule for how we are going to meet for the remainder of this year and also for 2025. We are trying to determine if we should continue to meet like the ACAT which is the fourth Monday at 1pm, or the way that CAC met which is the third Thursday at 5:30pm.

Chairperson Armand Turner asked if we were to choose the fourth Monday at 1pm, would we meet again in August?

Ms. Asia Hernton stated that this meeting would cover August. We could meet again at the end of the quarter in December, unless we have more meetings for other projects such as the Title VI Plan or Participation Plan. For those in attendance, does Monday at 1pm work or does Thursday at 5:30pm work?

Ms. Paula Valdez, Savannah Center for the Blind and Low Vision, stated she prefers Monday at 1pm.

Mr. Tony Abbott stated he prefers Thursday at 5:30pm.

Ms. A'riel Johnson, Interested Citizen, stated she prefers Monday at 1pm. No evenings.

Ms. Brendan Pollen, Housing Authority of Savannah, states she prefers Monday at 1pm. She is flexible.

Chairperson Armand Turner stated he sees about 6 or 7 people in the Zoom Chat that state they prefer Monday at 1pm. Ms. Patti Lyons asked if 1:30pm would be an option, and that works for him.

Ms. Asia Hernton stated that it seems the majority prefers Monday at 1pm or 1:30pm. We can decide on the time and also the next date to meet. We do have a plan update coming up for the Title VI Plan and Participation Plan. These plans are something that the TEPIAC has involvement with. The adoption date would be October 23 for both plans. Is there a Monday at 1pm that works best for everyone prior to the adoption date of October 23rd.

Chairperson Armand Turner stated that he is not available the second Monday of October, but the rest of the Mondays work.

Ms. Asia Hernton suggested sending out a poll.

Chairperson Armand Turner stated we can decide with the group that is present.

Ms. Asia Hernton stated let's put it to a motion then, if anyone would like to make a motion.

Mr. Ben Lewis, Chatham County motioned for Mondays at 1:30pm, Ms. Brenda Pollen seconded. The motion passed with none opposed.

Ms. Asia Hernton stated that CORE MPO staff will send out a poll for the best Monday in October before the 23rd adoption date.

Ms. Asia Hernton stated we are at the end of the process for the Moving Forward Together 2050 plan. This plan is created and managed by CORE MPO.

What is a Metropolitan Planning Organization?

- Federally mandated organizations for urban areas with a population over 50,000.
- Facilitation of collaboration between municipalities and counties.
- Allocate Funding Resources through the "3-C Process"
- Transportation Planning to Address Regional Needs and Priorities

We are projecting the CORE MPO Board to adopt the 2050 MTP in August.

What are the MPOs' planning documents?

- Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) is used to guide development/update of the plans.
- Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP)
- Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)
- Congestion Management Process (CMP)
- Public Participation Plan (PP)/Title VI Plans

What is the CORE MPO?

- MPO for the Savannah region. The CORE MPO Metropolitan Planning Area (MPA) boundary includes all of Chatham County and parts of Bryan and Effingham Counties.
- The MPA boundary was adopted by the CORE MPO Board in February 2024 and approved by the Governor of Georgia.

Who is CORE MPO? The CORE MPO Board

- Sets regional and long-term transportation policies.
- Prioritizes projects.
- Approves the long-range Metropolitan Transportation Plan, short-range Transportation Improvement Program, and other required planning documents.

4. Title VI Plan and Participation Plan Update

Ms. Asia Hernton gave the presentation on the Title VI Plan and the Participation Plan.

Title VI Plan Update Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, prohibits discrimination based upon race, color, and national origin. Specifically, 42 USC 2000d states that "No person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance." The use of the word "person" is important as the protections afforded under Title VI apply to anyone, regardless of whether the individual is lawfully present in the United States or a citizen of a State within the United States.

As a sub-recipient of FHWA and FTA funds, the CORE MPO's transportation planning program is required to comply with Title VI of the 1964 Civil Rights Act, the President's Executive Order on Environmental Justice, and related nondiscrimination statutes, executive orders, and federal regulations. The primary function of the CORE MPO's Title VI/Nondiscrimination Program is to address Title VI and Environmental Justice principles and requirements as they apply to the CORE MPO's transportation planning process. CORE MPO submits this Title VI Plan in compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 49 CFR Part 21, and the guidelines of FTA Circular 4702.1B, published October 1, 2012.

To comply, we manage a Title VI Plan that is periodically updated. The last update was in 2021, and we are now kicking off a new update that will be completed in the Fall of 2024.

The TEPIAC's role in this update is to ensure that we are on the right track with the plan content and public outreach.

Participation Plan Update The Participation Plan describes the strategies and techniques that the Coastal Region Metropolitan Planning Organization (CORE MPO) uses to inform and engage the public in transportation planning issues with the purpose of maximizing participation and effectiveness. This plan is a required MPO document and is used to direct the methods used to engage with the public. The last update of this plan was in 2021. We are not kicking off a new update that will be completed in the Fall of 2024.

The plan has been implemented since its adoption, providing participation guidance in the updates of the long-range Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) and the short-range Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). The Public Involvement Plan itself has been updated several times to reflect changing regulations and CORE MPO characteristics and is now known as the Participation Plan. CORE MPO aims to update the Participation Plan at least every five years.

5. Non-Motorized Transportation Plan Status Report

Ms. Asia Hernton stated that the Non-Motorized Transportation Plan is a document that addresses the development of bike and pedestrian infrastructure in the CORE MPO planning area. The goal of this plan update is to identify new projects, assess the needs of the community, and set new goals for bike and pedestrian infrastructure. This will be the first collaborative task of the Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee. Specifically, BPAC will oversee the update of this plan until its adoption. The aim is to adopt this plan before the end of 2024. Staff has compiled data, identified projects, and is drafting a project ranking methodology. BPAC will review the plan recommendations, project list, and scoring methodology to ensure

the plan wholistically addresses bike/pedestrian development in the region. Progress on the plan will continue after the adoption of the 2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan is adopted in August.

Chairman Armand Turner stated Ms. Hernton will send the scheduling Doodle Poll to the group to schedule the next meeting.
